He grew up in less than ideal circumstances. Much of his family perished in the plague, and he spent much of his youth on the notoriously treacherous streets of Rome. As a young man, he labored beneath others

much less talented than he and had difficulty making a living. He faced adversity at every turn.

And when his legendary temper threatened to get the best of him, he created his most vital masterpieces. The angry contrast between light and darkness that he felt deep in his soul now hangs in stark evidence in countless museums around the world.

Caravaggio's body of work is not only a great example of the Baroque period, but also a case study in the importance of art as an outlet.

Nearly single-handedly, Martha Graham brought dance into the 20th century. She did nothing less than create an entirely new genre of dance while shattering the

expectations of audiences and critics alike with her percussive, angular movement style. She was one of the first dancers to collaborate

with contemporary composers instead of using the 18th-and 19th-century compositions her predecessors favored. Her dances have been called "motion pictures for the sophisticated"; her theories on movement and kinesthetics are

still vital today; and there is scarcely a dancer alive who doesn't owe a huge debt to her sharp creative mind and fierce perfectionism. And to think she could have made it her entire life without experiencing the arts. Just like so many kids in our schools today.

No one has to tell parents that arts education is good for their kids. According to virtually every study out there, they already know that. Parents know that painting and music teach tolerance and openness, help their children express themselves creatively and contribute greatly to their kids' self-worth. On top of that, Tchaikovsky's composition teacher never liked his work, even after he became world-famous.

Setbacks such as these could have finished a lesser man. Instead, they informed his work,





LOUIS ARMSTRONG

WAS THE FIRST MAN

ON THE MOON.

It's a long way from the Apollo Theatre to the Apollo program. And while his playing may have been "as lofty as a moon flight," as Time magazine once suggested, that would be as close as Louis Daniel Armstrong would ever get to taking "one small step for man."

But as the premier jazz musician of the 20th



Armstrong left his footprints all over the jazz world. And ha usually did it in lace-up oxfords

century, giant leaps were a matter of course for Satchmo.

No person before or since has ever embodied — and revolutionized — jazz the way

Take solos, for instance. It's impossible to imagine jazz without them. But they actually didn't become an established part of the jazz vocabulary until Armstrong helped popularize them. Seventy years later, his solos are still revered for their audacity and virtuosity.

Louis Armstrong did.

In the 1950s, when his popularity became too big to be contained within our borders, he accepted an invitation from the State Department to act as an American goodwill ambassador around the world. And when he

became the last jazz musician to hit #1 on the Billboard pop chart, he beat the Beatles to do it.

Not bad for a kid whose first experience with a trumpet was as a guest in a New Orleans correction home for wayward boys. If only today's schools were as enlightened as that reformatory was.
